- Young parents are three times more at risk of experiencing homelessness compared to their non-parenting peers
- Infancy is the period of life when a child is at greatest risk of living in a homeless shelter across the country.
- For young children, homelessness can contribute to developmental, health, social and emotional, behavioral, and learning challenges.

MATERNITY GROUP HOME (MGH) PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Community-based, adult-supervised, long-term shelters, apartments and scattered-site apartments for pregnant and/or parenting youth ages 16 to under 22 and their dependent child(ren) who are homeless and cannot safely live with their own families.





MGH PROGRAM OFFERINGS

- Safe and stable housing in extended residential shelter for 18 months and, under extenuating circumstances, up to 21 months
- Comprehensive service model and case management plan with a positive youth development approach
- Transitional Living and aftercare plan with services for at least 3 months upon exit





COMPREHENSIVE SERVICES MODEL



- Record Keeping and Case Management for Infant/Toddler
- Child-Care Plan
- Child Development
- Parenting Skills
- Parenting curricula: Health and Nutrition
- Family Budgeting





FOUR CORE OUTCOME MEASURES

- 1. Social and Emotional Wellbeing
- 2. Permanent connections
- 3. Education or Employment
- 4. Stable housing

HEAD START AND EARLY HEAD START

Head Start

Created in 1965. Serves families with children ages 3-5.

- Migrant and Seasonal Head
 Start (MSHS), Created in 1969
 - Serves migrant and seasonal farmworker families with children ages birth-5.

• Early Head Start (EHS)
Created in 1995. Serves
families with children ages
birth-3 and pregnant women.

- EHS Child Care Partnerships
 Created in 2014
 - Funds EHS programs
 partnering with regulated
 child care and FCC providers





EARLY HEAD START PURPOSE

To promote school readiness by:

- Providing early care and education and comprehensive services
- Providing family-centered, culturally and linguistically responsive services
- Promoting parent-child relationships and the development of children
- Fostering parent engagement, parents as partners and as their child's lifelong teachers
- Supporting family wellbeing –health, safety & financial capability
- Engaging with community partners to support comprehensive service delivery

Hope House and Faith House

 Transitional and supportive housing programs for pregnant and parenting women 18 and older experiencing homelessness and instability.









MATERNITY GROUP HOME/RHY PROGRAM



- Housed in Grace House and Hope House
- Young mothers aged 16-22, either pregnant or parenting
- Working on education (HS, GED or College) and/or employment skills
- Engaged in parenting classes
- Provides trauma-informed, strengths based, developmentally based services through a reflective lens.
- Homeless Families are categorically eligible for EHS





CHILD CARE CENTER

- St. Ann's has offered high quality and safe child care to our residents and neighborhood families for more than 35 years
- First Infant Child Care Center licensed in the state of Maryland outside of a hospital
- Early Head Start Program began in 2018





KEY PARTNERSHIP STRATEGIES

- Hold staffing presentations to understand each program's services
- Establish referral protocols that prioritize EHS enrollment of pregnant young women, infants, and toddlers living in MGHs
- Ensure that young children in MGHs receive developmental screening and any needed follow up services
- Talk with your local Mc-Kinney Vento homeless liaisons to ensure that young parents and children are receiving any services for which they may be eligible







KEY PARTNERSHIP STRATEGIES

 Share ideas about creating early learning friendly environments in MGHs



- Leverage each program's resources to support young parents' employment, education, and career options
- Invite MGH parents to EHS parenting groups and activities, including those designed to involve fathers
