- Approaches to Learning focuses on how children learn; the skills and behaviors that children use to engage in learning
- Social development refers to a child's ability to create and sustain meaningful relationships with adults and other children.
 Emotional development refers to a child's ability to express, recognize, and manage their own emotions as well as respond appropriately to others' emotions
- Language and literacy development refers to emerging abilities in listening, understanding, and using language.
- Cognitive development includes reasoning, memory, problemsolving, and thinking skills that help young children understand and organize their world. For preschoolers, this evolves into complex mathematical thinking and scientific reasoning.
- Perceptual, Motor, and Physical Development is foundational to children's learning in all areas because it permits children to fully explore and function in their environment.

Strategies for Engagement

What Programs Can do to Support Fathers in the Early Years

Early Infancy



- Support caregiving activities; take advantage of routines to build relationships
 - Singing during diapering
 - Focused gaze during feeding
 - Supporting breastfeeding mothers
 - Hold your baby

"... He slept for days and I didn't know he had eyeballs or what - ... [the first time I got to lay down with him] we just stared at each other for an hour and I was just blown away. I thought that was just the coolest thing, you know, I'm studying every detail of his face and he's doing the same thing back to me. ...it's just so amazing. I just spend hours thinking 'Is that my nose? Are those my ears?' "

Later Infancy



- Talk to them
 - Share observations of your environment
 - Introduce new words and ways of using them
- Practice motor skills (standing, jumping, kicking)
- Read books, tell stories
- Let your child lead the interaction

One perfect spring day as I sat on my deck, I looked up from the book I was reading to see my daughter, then 2 1/2, nose-to-nose with the daffodils in our garden. Bending from one flower to another, she gave each of them a gentle kiss. Swamped with love and pride that I had produced such a sweet and tender child, I rushed to sit beside her. That's when she calmly turned, looked me straight in the eye, and said, "Go away, I don't want you here. I want Daddy."

Toddlerhood



- Play, play, play . . . and discovery
- Encourage exploration (toys, food)
- Be prepared to be imitated

Preschool



- Support academic development
- Allow fathers to "drop in" to the classroom
- Describe how any activity can present a learning opportunity

- Be playful
