

HSPPS Subpart J – 1302.101(b) Coordinated Approaches

(b) At the beginning of each program year, and on an ongoing basis throughout the year, a program must design and implement program-wide coordinated approaches that ensure

 (3) The full and effective participation of all children with disabilities, including but not limited to children eligible for services under IDEA, by providing services with appropriate facilities, program materials, curriculum, instruction, staffing, supervision, and partnerships, at a minimum, consistent with section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act and the Americans with Disabilities Act...

Family and Child Outcomes

Strength-Based Attitude:

- Families are our partners with a critical role in their child's development.
- Families' contributions are important and valuable.

Family Involvement



- Families participate in program activities and opportunities in their child's group care or home-based setting
- Information is exchanged between family members and education staff
- Education staff share resources and strategies to address parenting-related topics



Family Engagement

- Relationship-based
- Ongoing
- Responsive to strengths and needs of families
- Program-wide
- Collaborative
- Supportive of children's growth, development, and learning

Bridging Home and School with Family Partnersh
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Partnering with families to ensure:

- Incorporation of family observations, concerns, and knowledge about their child;
- Supports and interventions the child needs are in language(s) the family understands and agrees with; and

 Objections the family raise during the planning process are addressed.

- Engaging parents and families








Strength-Based Attitudes
