

- Everyone belongs










Considerations for Physical Arrangement

- Welcoming environment where everyone belongs
- A schedule that creates a flow
- Variety of learning centers with clear boundaries
- Noisy and quiet zones
- Avoid wide open areas
- Visually close areas when they are not open for use
- Intentionally chosen visuals and materials














Eliminate


unnecessary transitions and wait time


#6: Rules

A few simple, *positively stated* rules, that frame *safety* and the *well being* of community members and materials

- Involve children in developing rules
- Focused on keeping self, others and the classroom safe and ready for learning
- Teach proactively
- Post where children can see them
- Communicate to families
- Reinforce at high rates at the beginning and at lower rates throughout the year









#5 Staffing Charts & Zoning Zoning is an effective practice used to: • support children's active participation and engagement in the classroom • organize classroom staff by assigning specific roles and duties for the day or during a specific time of day, such as free play or outdoor time

























#2 Encourage Offer behavior specific praise and encouragement Think about what you want to see more of • Make a point to notice this throughout the day • Make reminders for yourself to notice
